Lowrey Undergoes Many Changes; Basement Sparkles

The changes in our building are many as you know. The Lowrey Light staff has checked on all of the changes and will explain them to you in detail during the next three issues.

In this issue of the Lowrey Light the staff would like to introduce you to the changes in the ground floor.

In the next two issues we will try and bring closer to you the changes that are being made on the first and second floors.

The major part of construction in Lowrey is being done in the basement.

A great change is taking place in the kitchen and cafeteria section. The cafeteria will be complete with indirect lighting, painted plaster walls, sound proof ceiling and new ceiling fixtures. In place of the old sky-light there will be an illuminated ceiling. A new kitchen will be in place of the old lunch line, while the old kitchen is converted into a hall, with three social science classrooms, and an office.

The old chemistry room is being remodeled and made into a math room. Across from this new math room lavatory facilities are being installed.

The old print shop is being converted into the student supply room. The old supply room and Mr. Howser's old room will be combined to make up the new drafting room. Mr. Rice's homeroom is being remodeled into an elementary music room.

A P.T.A. room is now being built across from the Physics room. They are also putting new fire bricks in the furnace and new gas lines to the furnace.

Florescent and recessed lighting will be spread throughout the basement. New gray tile puts a finishing touch on the remodeling of the basement.
