The High School Student Council Leadership Workshop's main purpose was to "help one understand one's self and develop leadership qualities." Each day Anita participated in a two-hour clinic during which she and Student Council leaders from other schools traded ideas about aims and activities for a good Student Council. Making up the rest of her'day were two, two-hour long reaction groups in which the participants had many frank discussions concerning politics, religion, social values, and moral problems.

There were students at Interlochen from all over the state of Michigan. They were the best music students from their respective schools.

Although she had to spend four and five hours each day in rehearsal, Anita found plenty of time for activities such as swimming, tennis and archery.

At night, the students attended various choral and instrumental concerts. One of the high points of her stay was a recreation day in which everyone had a lot of fun.

Language Teacher Visits Russia

Last summer Miss Romanow, Lowrey's language teacher, visited Russia and attended the University of Moscow for ten weeks as part of a cultural exchange program between



Russia and the United States. All of her expenses were paid by the Soviets.

She was selected along with 24 other college and high school instructors to participate in this teacher exchange program. Miss Romanow applied for this program to the Inter-University Commission, whose chairman is in Indiana. Some of the qualifications needed to apply were to be able to read, write and speak Russian fluently.

The main reason for this program was to help the American instructors to improve and perfect their Russian and to help the teachers of both countries to exchange study methods. They received no accreditation for the course; they participated only for self-improvement. Her schedule consisted of six hours of class three days a week, and four hours of class two days a week. On these two days she also went on sight-seeing excursions. She had Sundays free. The only language spoken in her classes was Russian.

Some of the places of interest she saw while she was in Russia were Red Square, the Lenin Library, and Lenin's tomb. She spent many of her evenings going to operas, plays, and ballets.

When asked what she thought of the Russian people she replied, "I found all of the people I met in Russia very friendly and hospitable."

Lowrey Student Sees President

Hugh Gallagher, one of Lowrey's seniors, was present when President Johnson gave his Labor Day speech to a crowd of over 100,000 in Kennedy Square (formerly Cadillac Square in downtown Detroit.

According to Hugh the speeches given by President Johnson, Walter Reuther, Governor Romney, Senator Philip Hart, and Congressman at large Neil Staebler were very interesting.

Also present at Kennedy Square was Mrs. Johnson.

Highlights of the President's 40 minute speech were his statement for more government unity and his plea for world peace. Brought into mind also by the President was the question of international disarmament. This speech began Johnson's campaign for re-election.






