Mrs. Anderson



On behalf of the student body and faculty, we wish all graduating seniors success and happiness in their future years.


Gold And Silver "L" Winners Announced

Spotlight On Coaching

This issue of the Lowrey Light will feature the field of an athletic coach

DUTIES

The duty of a coach is ti coach team or individual sports. He may specialize in one sport or one aspect of a sport. He must also plan and organize practice sessions and strategy. He may teach physical education, health, and academic subjects. He may make business arrangements and give press interviews.

WHERE THEY ARE EMPLOYED

Athletic coaches are employed by high schools, colleges, professional teams, and by athletic clubs and associations. They are employed in rural as well as urban areas througout the U.S.

THE NUMBER OF WORKERS

Statistics in 1963 showed that there were approximately 77,000 sports instructors and officials. Nearly one third of this figure represent women.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

To enter this field, a college degree with credits in education and physical education are needed. A graduate degree is helpful for college coaches.

SPECIAL QUALIFICATIONS

Some special qualifications for this field are leadership ability, good judgment, fairness, physical stamina, and good character. It is also desirable to have a love of sports and expert knowledge of rules and strategies. In addition to this, you must have a teacher's certificate.

WAYS TO ENTER THE FIELD

You may enter this field through a college placement bureau or through a personal recommendation. You may also start as an assistant coach of a college team, as a teacher-coach or as a physical education instructor in high school.

CHANCE OF ADVANCEMENT

You can move up from assistant to head coach. You can get a college coaching job, become an athletic director, a school administrator, or a camp director.

EARNINGS

The earnings for coaches are \$4500 to \$20,000 for high school and college coaches, with the latter earning more on the average. Professional coaches may earn \$50,000 per year.

SUPPLY AND DEMAND

The demand for qualified men and women is increasing. The competition is brisk for men's coaching jobs in top colleges and high schools.


Jim plans on going to H.F.C.C., and work part time while Randy plans on going right into the field after graduation. He also plans on doing radio and electronic work in the service.

Southgate added one futile run in the last inning on two singles and a walk



Steve Gerych picked up the win, his fourth against no defeats.


