Lowrey Tradition Carried On

Thursday, we will be commemorating more than Armistice which ended one of the worst wars in history. We will be also dedicating and consecrating a day in honor of the men—fathers, grandfathers, brothers, cousins, and uncles who fought and died upholding those truths which we hold to be self-evident: All men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

In times of peace, we as young people find it hard to visualize the hardships and sufferings these men and their families endured. It was Abraham Lincoln who eloquently voiced the position and duty of the people in the address at Gettysburg:

"But in larger sense we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. It is for us, the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of that devotion, that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that government of the people, by the people, and for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

It is for this reason that we may better understand and respect our heritage and freedom that Lowrey High School holds a Veterans' Day on November 11.

Ceremonies will begin at 9:00, Thursday with the entire school gathered outside the building for the raising of "Old Glory." Each year the superintendent of school, starting with Harvey H. Lowrey, has given a significant speech. This year Dr. Cole will be the guest speaker. A plaque will be presented by Dr. Seavitt upon which are inscribed the name of Lowrey alumni who fought and died in our nation's war. A gun



In a gamedominated by rain and gusts of wind, our varsity football team edged Schafer 13-12 to remain tied with Southgate for first place in the Tri-River league. Both were undefeated going into the head on clash October 29th.

The Polar Bears scored first on a one-yard plunge by John Hull that was set up by a blocked punt. The other Lowrey touchdown was made on a run of 37 yards by Bill Holbird after intercepting a Schafer pass. Richard Mitchell kicked the extra point, which later proved to be the winning point.

Schafer tried desperately in the second half and was able to score a touchdown in both the third and fourth quarters. On the fourth quarter touchdown, which was scored late in the game, Schafer tried for the extra point on a run, but was stopped just short of the goal line. The score ended at 13-12.

Lowrey Reserves Split

The reserve football team won its second league game on Thursday, October 14, by defeating Cherry Hill 27-7.

Lowrey started its march right away. Scott Neusel scored our first touchdown on a quarterback sneak on our one yard line. Howard Elandt ran the extra point, making the score 7-0.

In the second quarter Howard Elandt ran a slant on the six yard line for the second touchdown. Willis Branton caught the ball for the extra point. The score was 14-0.

Just before the half, Jessen threw a pass to Branton from the five yard line for the third touchdown. Krogulecki caught the extra point.

In the fourth quarter, Scott Neusel sneaked in from the two yard line. The extra point attempt failed.

Cherry Hill took the kick-off and worked thier way into Lowrey's zone and scored on a pass play. The game ended in a 27-7 victory for Lowrey's reserves. The reserve football team lost their first league game to Schafer on October 21.


