Seniors Bound For Academy

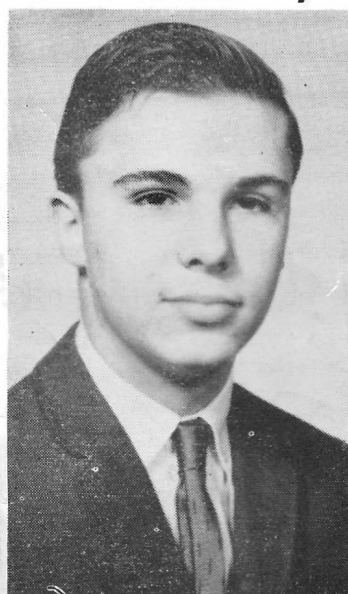


Larry Kubicz, 12A-5

The boys are to arrive at the Academy on June 28, 1965, for 7½ weeks of basic training. This training is to physically condition them for the strenuous activities which they will encounter. For the final test of their basic training they will be dropped from a helicopter ten miles from the Academy and will be required to find their way back.

The classes will begin in late August or early September following basic training. The new cadets will be required to remain at the Academy until Christmas. The education system at the Air Force Academy is on a year-around basis with a four-week summer vacation.

Spring Elections Coming Soon

Members of the Sophomore and Junior Class will have a chance to take part in the student affairs of Lowrey by running for a class office or for student council.

Petitions were handed out on Tuesday, May 4. The elections for class officers and for student council will be held at the end of May.

Class offices that are open are president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. The student council has the offices of president (candidate must be senior in term of office), vice-president, corresponding secretary, secretary, and treasurer.

The qualifications for the candidate for class office or student council are as follows:

1. Must have a 2.4 average (all subjects) with no E's and not more than one D in the previous semester and the last card marking of the present semester.
2. Must agree to carry out to the best of his abilities the duties and responsibilities of the office which he is seeking.
3. Must agree that he will resign immediately in the event that he fails to maintain a 2.4 average in any marking period.
4. Must agree to have his petition and credentials passed upon by his counselor, sponsor, and assistant principal.
5. No student may run for student council and class office at the same time.

Further details and information can be obtained from the counselors or by checking the daily bulletin.

Sr. Scholars Score

The senior class is making an outstanding record for itself in the number of students who plan to attend, or who have been accepted at, various universities. Also impressive is the number of scholarships winners. The scholarship winners listed below intend to use their scholarships. Outstanding participants in the State of Michigan Competitive Scholarship tests recently received a notice from the Scholarship Committee that it would co-sign for the student for a \$500 loan.

The students who are presently accepting their scholarship are: Eve Brill, 12A-1, Mike Casey, 12A-2, Tim Press 12A-8, and Linda Wilkinson 12A-10.

Eve's scholarship encompasses tuition and fees renewable each year from Wayne State University. Eve is planning to go into a career of biological research. She commented that she was thrilled with the scholarship.

Mike received \$280 from the State of Michigan Competitive Scholarship Fund and a promissory note to co-sign on a loan of \$500 from the same fund. The \$280 is for Mike to go to the University of Michigan but he is now considering HFCC and it may be reduced to a lesser sum to go to the Community College. "I was surprised and happy," he said. "I hope I can make full use of the scholarship."

Tim is leaving for college life at Oakland University in the fall. His scholarship includes \$200 from Oakland a \$250 loan, \$330, and the co-signing note for \$500 loan from the State of Michigan Competitive Scholarship Fund. Tim commented, "I'm very happy and I hope this will give me a real incentive to do well in college." He is as yet undecided in reference to his future vocation.

Linda is accepting a scholarship to Eastern Michigan University.

The scholarship is from the State of Michigan Competitive Scholarship Fund for \$300, renewable each year. Linda is planning to become a special education teacher and will be living on Eastern's campus beginning this autumn.

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Science News

Meteor or Comet? The famed Tunguska meteorite crater may not have been caused by a meteorite after all. According to reports seeping out from behind the Iron Curtain, Russian scientists claim the crater was formed when a comet hit the earth.

Well, whatever it was that did create the crater, it did so in 1908, in a remote forest area near a town named Tunguska in Russia's notorious Siberia.

The crater itself is very odd indeed. The trees are bent to the crater for miles around and strangely enough no meteor particles were found anywhere.

A fair radioactive count is present in the area. Many theories have been offered as an explanation for the crater, such as:

- 1- A very large meteor exploded before hitting the ground.
- 2- The comet theory.
- 3- One Russian scientist claimed that it was possible that a spacecraft with an atomic propulsion system from outer space may have blown up while in flight over the area.

Op Art

Pictures that attack the eye.

Op is short for optical. The Op style of art produces eye-teasing that is known as optical illusions. These paintings are scientific as well as artistic. According to Mr. Jones, "This scientific or mathematical approach is creating an entirely new experience for the painter. The art student at Lowrey finds this quite stimulating and a unique way in which to conceive a painting. This experience may be transferred, in many ways, to more traditional types of work." All such paintings are constructed to play tricks on your eyes, that is, to see something that's not really there.

In Op art, you see such things as: shimmers, ripples, blurs, jumpings, bulges, wiggles, shifts, and shakes.

Op art is now at its peak of popularity. Students as well as grown-ups are becoming more and more interested in it.

In Time magazine last October this comment on Op art was made: "Man's eyes are not windows, although he has long regarded them as such. They can be baffled, bogged, and balked. They often see things that are not there and fail to see things that are. In the eyes resides man's first sense, and it can be deceived."

The Op art fad has captured the imagination of a large group of advanced painting students here at Lowrey's first literary magazine, has results of their work.

The wood shop received recognition for a project which took third place. This entry, a wooden bowl by Abbot Mathis, was made in about two weeks with the use of a lathe.

The contest was held to encourage and recognize fine craftsmanship among students and teachers in the field of industrial arts, and trade and technical education.

The projects, along with the entry forms, were sent to the John Glenn High School in Wayne where they were judged and granted the awards.

He also has the opportunity to further his education leading to another degree.
