Japanese In B.C. America ? ?

Fragments of ancient pottery found in Ecuador indicate that the Japanese landed in America in 3000 B.C. thousands of years before Leif Erickson or Christopher Columbus. There are strong similarities between the designs and pottery technique of ancient Ecuadorian artifacts and those of ancient Japanese pottery.

The pottery fragments, unearthed at the village Valdivia, on the Pacific coast of Ecuador, show markings such as zigzag gouges, parallel lines, and grooves that were uncommon elsewhere in the world at that time except on Japanese pottery, in particular from the Jomon sights on the westerly islands of Honshu and Kyushu.

The pottery was made in Ecuador under the influence of the Japanese, archeologists theorized that possibly a fishing boat was caught in a typhoon off Japan and was swept away in prevailing ocean currents, traveling first to the northeast, then to the southeast on an arc of more than eight thousand miles across the Pacific Ocean. Before that time, the people of that area did not know how to make pottery.

Now instead of celebrating Christopher Columbus Day, we should celebrate Japanese Typhoon Day!!!

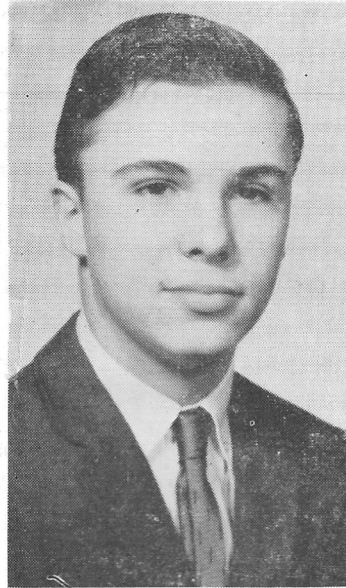
Apathetic Seniors

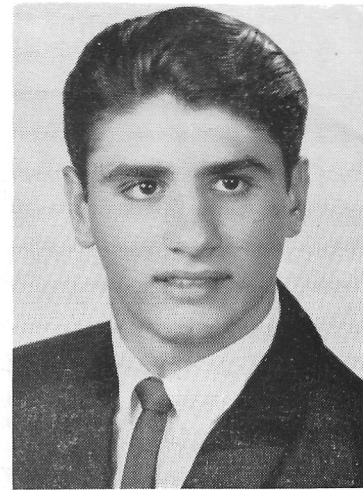

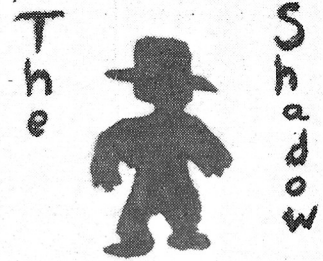

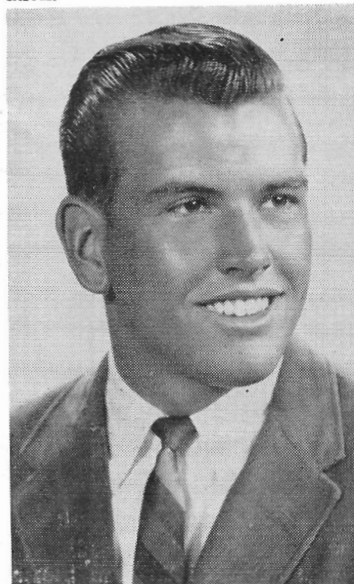

More Honors For Football

Recently members of Lowrey's varsity football team were honored by the Dearborn Heights Leader for outstanding play in our area. A total of 11 boys received trophies. They will not be handed out to the boys until after graduation in June.

Three players from Lowrey made the all-area offensive unit. They were quarterback Bill Holbird, right halfback Ray Gierucki, and left end Bob Fox; all three are Seniors.

Bill Holbird is the fastest player on the team. He recently set a track record for the half mile. He is also an all A student.

Pound for pound, Ray Gierucki is the hardest runner in the Dearborn Heights area.

Bob Fox who led Lowrey in pass receptions grabbed 19 for 405 yards and 5 touchdowns.

Five Lowrey players made the all-area defensive squad. They were seniors Richard Mitchell, Don Bogataj, Dave Zuk, John Flanigan, and junior John Hull.

Richard Mitchell was Lowrey's punter with a 42-yard average. He was also first on the team with the most tackles.

Don Bogataj is the strongest player and was sixth for Lowrey in tackles.

Dave Zuk was the hardest worker on the squad and improved every game. He is also an all A student.

John Flanigan is, pound for pound, the toughest player around. He was second in tackles and is well respected by others on his team.

John Hull was third in tackles and on offense he gained 348 yards in 67 carries and had two touchdowns.

The four Lowrey honorable mentions were Doug Anderson, Bill Meggion, Joe Marchetti, and Tony Ortega.
