Required Fees

There are various fees required for some of the courses offered here. For the most part the fees are for materials used in the classes. This is the list of courses which require fees:

Band—

A fee of \$3.00 is required. This includes rental and all repair work on school owned instruments.

Chemistry—

A total fee of \$2.00 is required per semester, \$1.00 is for chemicals used, and the other \$1.00 is for breakage which is refunded if nothing is broken. There is a lab manual which must be purchased costing \$1.50.

Biology—

A fee of \$1.00 is required for materials used in dissection.

Typing—

A fee of 25 cents each semester is used to buy envelopes, carbon paper, ribbons, and stencils. In Typing III, a workbook must be purchased which costs \$1.00. Typing paper is not provided but can be purchased in the school supply room for 7 cents a pack.

Homemaking—

A fee of \$1.00 is required in cooking or sewing for materials used.

Shop—

A \$1.00 fee for materials used is required in machine, metal, and wood shop.

Art—

A fee of \$1.00 is required for materials used.

**Lowrey Undergoes
Many Changes**

During the past few months many changes have occurred in Lowrey School's building and faculty. Workers have been toiling on the outside of the building, painters have been busy throughout the summer and new reproductions of classical art works have been added to our building. This fall we have many new faculty members in our building. In the next issues of the Lowrey Light we will report in detail on these changes and improvements.

Student Council

Lowrey's Student Council, like any other, is operated for the good of the student body. It has many functions and duties to perform for the school. With the many sub-committees under it, it has played, and will continue to play, an important part in the school's activities.

Recently the council donated fifty dollars to a foreign-exchange student who will be visiting the United States soon. The council also has sponsored many dances and has sold refreshments at all games.

It cooperates entirely with the surrounding councils of the Dearborn schools and together they have been able to achieve more and better things for the students.

The council is always open to suggestions from the student body to help improve the school in any way possible.

Each year new officers and representatives are elected to the council and anyone with a good average is open for nomination. The representatives report to their class the matters discussed at the previous meeting. In this way the students are well informed on all matters of the school.

The Student Council plays a very important role in the school and will continue to do so as long as it has good students as its members.

Under the council's new constitution there will be a new executive board. The newly elected executive officers are juniors Priscilla Caldes and Marynelle Hall, and Sophomores Janice Gerstvr and Kathy Dearvang. Student Council President, Jack Mihalko, and Vice-President, Jerry Tripod, are also on the board.

RULES AND REGULATIONS AT LOWREY

Lowrey High School starts at 8:45 and releases at 3:35. Homeroom, or Record Period is ten minutes, from 8:45 to 8:55.

The class hours run as follows:

Hour	Time
First	9:00 to 9:55
Second	10:00 to 10:55
Third	11:00 to 11:55
Fourth	12:00 to 12:45
Fifth	12:50 to 1:35
Sixth	1:40 to 2:35
Seventh	2:40 to 3:35

There are five minutes between classes. During this time you are expected to go to your locker, get your books, get to your class, sharpen your pencil, if necessary, and be in your seat when the bell rings.

Tardy slips are obtained from your counselor. Three times tardy to one class will lower your grade one half grade in that same class.

Tardiness is very serious and will not be tolerated at Lowrey. Five minutes is ample time to get to your class and prepare your materials.

There are three lunch periods at Lowrey. Third hour lunch starts at 11:00 and ends at 11:55. Fourth hour lunch begins at 12:00 and ends at 12:45. Fifth hour is from 12:50 until 1:35.

In the school cafeteria there are two counters. In one you receive the hot lunch of the day, for 40 cents. In the other you can get a bowl of soup, a sandwich, dessert, and milk, all for 37 cents. You may also buy soup, salads, jello, or cupcakes separately at this counter. Milk purchased alone costs 2 cents a carton.

Lowrey's cafeteria has been highly regarded in the past by many people. They have said that Lowrey serves the best food of all the Dearborn schools. We are proud of this. We hope you will be too.

All students are to eat in the school cafeteria. Students may go outside after eating but must observe the following rules:

1. Students may not enter any business establishments.
2. Eating in any restaurant is prohibited.
3. Students may not drive a car or be in a car unless they are given a special permit.
4. Students may not congregate in groups of more than three or four.
5. Students may not smoke in cars or on the streets.
6. Students may not be in or around any residences or in garages.
7. Food of any type may not be taken out of the cafeteria at any time.

These are some of the rules that are to be observed before and after school hours by all students. This area is patrolled and violators will be suspended from school.

1. Be on time.
2. Take your seat immediately. You must be in your seat before the bell rings.
3. Bring work for entire period.
4. Be quiet ! ! !
5. Roll is taken when room is quiet.
6. No permit will be signed until roll is taken.
7. Passes from study hall: consultations, pre-signed to classrooms, pre-signed to library.
8. Library must be pre-signed by classroom teacher (for full hour).
9. Occasional work consultations arranged with teacher in charge.
10. Locker and lavatory permits—emergency only.

No cars are to be driven to school, unless you are signed to co-op training.

Here is what you have to do to drive to school.

1. Register in the office.
2. Park your car in the athletic field area.
3. Do not remove car until after school is let out.
4. Have registration number on the car at all times.
5. Leave at proper time, do not drive around building.

If you are tardy it is unexcused. All districts provide buses, you are expected to ride them. If you are on a late bus, you are excused.

When a student is absent from school parents are to call counselor's office on the day of absence: before 9:00 a.m.

After an absence the pupil must have an absence slip before going to class.

Permission slips must be obtained when it is necessary to leave the building. There is little excuse for being late; five minutes is enough time to go from one class to another.

Absence slips must be signed by each teacher that the pupil has.

If an absence is necessary for any reason other than an illness, permission must be obtained from the counselor before the absence.

Citizenship of Students

1. No extreme haircuts or hair dos.
2. Boys do not wear jeans or levis.
3. Boys wear clean and pressed trousers.
4. Girls wear sensible shoes, skirts and sweaters or blouses, or dresses, a reasonable amount of make-up.
5. Boys wear sensible shoes and no extremes.

If a student is found in violation of the rules concerning citizenship, the penalty may be severe.

Introducing

Our Mascot

The polar bear was adopted as the official mascot for the high school in 1946. It was formerly the mascot of the junior high.

The polar bear statue, which stands in the middle of the main hall, was a project of the W. P. A. (Works Project Administration) during the depression. It was a part of the government's effort to create jobs for artists who were out of work. When it was completed, it was donated to the school by the government.

For quite a few years, the statue stood in the study hall, but was then moved to a corner of the main hall by the stairs. In April of 1961, it was moved to the middle of the main hall so that every Lowrey student could see it easily.

SCHOLARSHIPS

There are many scholarships available for eligible high school graduates interested in furthering their formal education. There are many factors evaluated before a scholarship is awarded. Two of the most common factors are aptitude and proved scholastic ability. Shortage of space makes it impossible for this paper to give you detailed scholarship information. However, we suggest that if you are interested in obtaining more information on this subject that you check with your counselor when it is convenient for you and for him.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

In the following we have attempted to give information that will enable you to plan for your future education.

Requirements for graduation from Lowrey High School are a minimum of 15 credits, plus 1 year of health education. A student must attend for 6 semesters, grades 10 through 12. A student who attends Lowrey for 3 years will accumulate 15 credits or more.

The following subjects are required of all students:

- English—3 years—10, 11, 12
- Social Studies—2½ years—9A, 10A, 11B, 11A, 12B
- Mathematics—1 year—10, 11, 12
- Science—1½ years—10B, 10A, 11B, 11A, 12B, 12A
- Physical Education and Group Guidance—1 year—10B, 11B, 11A, 12B

—plus enough electives to total 15 credits in grades 10 through 12.

The normal load each semester is 5 classes, including Physical Education and a Study Hall. No Physical Education is required in 11th and 12th, allowing for greater possibility of electives.

In addition to these areas, we have a wide variety of Homemaking, Music, Instrumental Music, Art, Shops, and Commercial classes which can help enrich the students' program. We suggest that each student take a class or two of such enrichment classes during the 11th and 12th grades.

If you are interested in preparing for further education at College level, the following is a partial explanation of the requirements. Ask your counselor for more explicit information.

To qualify for college entrance you must have 2 major and 2 minor sequences. These must be selected from the following 5 fields of study. (1) English, (2) Foreign language, (3) Mathematics, (4) Science, (5) Social Studies.

A Major sequence is 3 year of credit in a field of study.

Example: Major in Science is 1 year Biology; 1 year Chemistry
1 year Physics

A Minor sequence is 2 years of credit in a field of study.

Example: Minor in Mathematics is 1 year of Algebra, 1 year of Geometry.

Most colleges require a recommendation from the High School Principal on their application blank. Our regulation is: The above requirements must be met and the student must have a "B" average or in the top third of his class as a minimum requirement.

New Teachers

Lowrey has many new teachers in its high school this year. Here is a list of some of the new teachers and their subjects. The English department has three new teachers. They are Mrs. Thelma Jean Doughty, Mr. John Dodary, who will also be an assistant football coach, and Mr. Lloyd Meredith, who will also teach dramatics. New to the mathematics department are Mr. James Boatwright and Mr. Robert Flee, who will also assist coach Boach with the football team.

Mr. Robert LeVecque, a student teacher last year, will stay on in the art department, replacing Mr. Jones who is on a one year leave of absence. Mrs. Betty Weller and Mr. Ralph Wonders are two teachers who have joined our commercial department. We also have a new assistant principal in the high school. (Mr. Cady has replaced Mrs. Murray who retired at the end of the last school year.) Mr. Ralph Dzovigian is the new assistant principal and the Lowrey Light hopes to give its readers a fuller introduction to Mr. Dzovigian and the new teachers in its future issues.

Swimming

Swimming is a popular indoor and outdoor sport. Fortunately here at Lowrey we have a fine, spacious indoor pool. We also have a varsity team that meets its competition in winter and spring. Mr. Sande is the coach and he encourages and invites all boys interested in swimming to come on out for the team. As we heard so often during the summer, "Come on out, the water's fine."

Introducing Some School Clubs

FIZZ-KEM CLUB

The Fizz-Kem Club is open to every student who has acquired a science minor or will complete one at the end of this school year. The club's program consists of lectures, movies, and demonstrations on all phases of science. Members are given the opportunity to further their knowledge and interest in whatever field of science they like.

The club's previous history is one of esteem and pride. Besides providing hours of educational enjoyment for its members, the Fizz-Kem Club has completed many worthwhile projects.

There are no club dues, but there is a limited membership, so if you want to join this organization you must do so at the first or second meeting.

Future Teachers Club

Are you interested in teaching? Would you like to have some high-school experience in working with students of the grade level of your choice? If so, you should join the Future Teachers' Club. This organization provides many opportunities to learn new ideas of various teaching methods, ways of handling children, and many other topics.

During the past year, the F.T.A. has managed to set up a cadet teaching program. In this plan, members of the club are able to observe various methods of teaching by visiting a particular class for a certain amount of time. Many times it is possible for the person to later teach the class on his own. This idea has worked out very well and is hoped to be continued for a long time.

The Future Teachers have done many other things in the field of teaching. They have visited different colleges and universities such as University of Michigan, Eastern, and Junior College. These tours have been very enjoyable and have given very good ideas of college life.

These are only examples of the many activities put on by the Future Teachers.

Any senior high school student may join the F.T.A., including both boys and girls. We especially encourage the boys to join since there are as many men teachers as women, if not more.

The club's officers, Jerry Tripod, President; Judy Gill, Vice-President; Anne Marie Lowell, Secretary-Historian; and Sharyn Thrasher, Treasurer, all extend an invitation to anyone interested in the field of education, to come to any of the meetings.

BOOSTER CLUB

All Senior High Students interested in supporting their school and boosting school spirit are invited to join the Booster Club. This club's main objective is to promote and encourage school spirit and student participation. In the past the Booster Club has sponsored an annual Kick-Off Dance and usually another dance during the year. Booster members sell candy, pennants, and pompoms at all football and basketball games. The Booster Club is also in charge of choosing girls to be Lowrey's traditional Polar Bear mascot. The Booster Club does much for the school in the line of student achievement.

Booster meetings are held every other Wednesday after school. Attendance is very important and a Booster Button is given to all new members who attend regularly for at least three weeks in a row.

The club's new officers are, Mary-nelle Hall, President; Diane Peirce, Vice-President; Linda Zimmerman, Corresponding Secretary; Judy Gill and Pat Van Assche, Merit Secretaries. The club's sponsor is Mr. Fedoruk.

Being an active member of the Booster Club is an excellent way to earn a letter and to show your interest in your school.

ANNUAL CONCERTS

Two annual traditions for Lowrey include the presentation of a Christmas Concert and a Spring Concert.

Members of the band and chorus work hard on a wide variety of musical numbers to present at each of these events.

The Christmas Concert brings the solemn note to the school year with the hymns and carols traditional of the season.

Spring and flowers blooming bring forth bright and cheerful numbers from both departments of music in Lowrey. This event also brings the colors of the flowers forth when the female members of the performers dress up in semi-formals. The male members are attired in tuxedos to make the occasion a very festive one.

FUTURE NURSES CLUB

The Future Nurses Club is open to all students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades, who are interested in nursing and the allied careers of medicine. The club meets twice a month.

The purposes of the club are:

1. To interest students in personal and community health.
2. To encourage and advise these students in finding out what nursing requires, and what it offers.
3. To help them decide wisely about a profession or practical nursing as a career.
4. To assist the school nurse in school health programs.
5. To sponsor charitable programs.

BAND ACTIVITIES

Lowrey High band, under the direction of Mr. Eero B. Keranen, provides many opportunities for the aspiring musicians of Lowrey to further their musical background.

In the fall of the year, the band practices many marches and they perform during the half-time sessions of the home football games. The biggest event of the fall, the Homecoming, finds the band "giving their all" to putting on a special half-time show.

As soon as football season ends, the band begins work for the Christmas Concert. This is held just before school is let out for the holidays.

Many of the band members work on solos and ensembles for the "Solo and Ensemble Festival" held in February at Eastern Michigan University. In the past, many of these members have received first division ratings, and have then gone on to the state finals, where they have fared well.

The band works especially hard on the big event of the spring, the Spring Concert. Each year, there has been a different theme, with decorations and music harmonizing.

The last week in April usually sees the band members getting their marching shoes out and preparing for the Dearborn Memorial Day Parade.

The last item on the band's agenda is the Commencement for the Seniors. They play the traditional graduation music for this occasion.

LOWREY'S S. I. O.


"Youth for Understanding" seems to be the motto for the Students' International Organization of Lowrey. The club is the backbone for the foreign exchange student plan for Lowrey.

Football Season Is Here Again


