

More Changes at Lowrey

This is the last of a series of three articles written on the recent and current changes at Lowrey School.

In this issue we will point out some of the main changes on the second floor.

One of the many places being remodeled is the gym balcony.

The workmen have cleared away all the old chairs and bleachers. This area is leveled off and sliding bleachers will be installed. Mr. Gretzner is using this area for tennis, badminton, wrestling, boxing, ping pong, and other games.

New lighting has been installed and as you might have noticed the windows have been partially filled in and will be painted soon. Remaining windows are tinted so the brightness is cut off.

New sliding baskets are being installed. When there's a game they can be lowered and students will be able to see the action better. The stationary baskets (which aren't new) and the sliding baskets will have glass backboards.

Further down the hall is Mrs. Koehler's old English room, which has been converted into a sparkling new music room. The room is occupied by Mr. Coedy. The room has new risers, so everyone can be seen plainly. New tile has been installed also. The room is going to have double thick doors and windows which will be soundproof. There will be cabinets along the back wall, which will hold all the music. There will be two speakers on the front wall, which will be for stereo records, taperecorder, and the radio. The workmen have added a new chalk board with scales on both ends. This room will hold approximately 80 students. It is room number 200.

Another change on the second floor is the new oral deaf room for both Junior and Senior High students which is now located in the northeast hall of the second floor.

This room is half the width of a classroom. The room 213, is brightly painted, which makes it pleasant for the students.

With all of these changes being completed soon throughout the school Lowrey will have been remodeled to better suit the needs of both the faculty and students. These changes have cost a great deal of money and are sure to be appreciated by everyone.



Lowrey's 1962 Homecoming was held Friday, October 19. To begin the traditional event a pep rally and Homecoming parade were held on the football field before the game. The parade consisted of the band, majorettes, cheerleaders, polar bear, and a series of decorated convertibles carrying the Homecoming Queen, Lois Bellottie, and her court. New Lighting To be Completed Soon

The \$200,000 electrical work in Lowrey is now being completed by 14 of the original 33 workers from the Colonial Electric Company, a company which specializes in institutional work.

Approximately 100,000 feet of wire has been distributed throughout the building. The central distribution center, which is located in the boiler room, supplies electricity to sub-distribution centers throughout the building. These in turn supply the school with electricity.

Eighty per cent of electrical work has been completed in the building with the wiring in the gym being completed by Nov. 1.

There are 50 wiring power chan-

nels in the building. Besides providing us with all new wiring the company has also set up a P. A. system in the gym and little theatre.

Our new wiring system has also included a new fire alarm system. Previous, if a fire broke out in the school it could not be located. But now, because of the new fire alarm system, a fire can be pinpointed in any area of the building. The company has also assisted Bell Telephone in putting in new telephones in our school.

Although the work may look complicated, it really isn't, after it is broken down into individual parts, with a specialized man working on each part.

With better lighting facilities we will be able to work better both athletically and scholastically. Then, also, remember without the new system, it would be just Lowrey, no Light.

Editorial

During 1962 about 230 students will graduate from Lowrey. These students will face a serious employment problem. The October 22 issue of "The New Republic," states that 26 million workers under 25 will pour into the labor force during the 1960's.

According to the statistics given by the July issue of the "School Life" magazine there were approximately 1.9 million high school graduates in 1961, 48 per cent were enrolled in college, 8 per cent in special trade or business schools. More than 700,000 graduates, who did not enter college, were employed or seeking employment, only 82 per cent found jobs.

The high school drop out faces an even more serious problem. 8½ per cent of all drop outs are unemployed. Those that do find jobs are unskilled and have little hope for advancement.

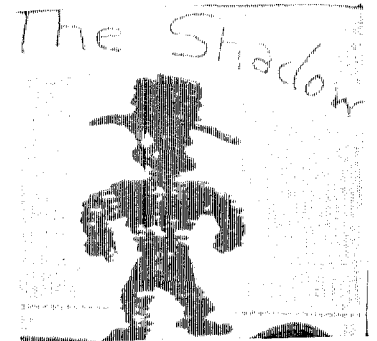
Many students do not realize that this problem affects them. Not only does it affect the seniors, but it affects all students, everywhere in our country.

Everyone should do some serious thinking about the importance of a good education and what he wants out of life.

Mr. Reginald Davies, a representative from the Community College, met with approximately 30 students on October 3, at Lowrey School. He explained the requirements for entering Henry Ford. Any graduate from a Dearborn school has a chance of being accepted, but since there has been such a large number of students applying, those with the higher scholastic record will be accepted first. The grade average of students who have been accepted in the past has been C plus or better.

The club, since its beginning in 1959, has been a sub-committee of the Student Council, but has functioned as a separate organization when we had a foreign student. Another of the reasons there is no exchange student this year is that there was no host family. Back of our exchange program is the Michigan Council of Churches. The Youth of Understanding Teen-Age Exchange Program first started after World War II when it was thought this might encourage more friendliness and understanding in the world. We also had a "back-up" group of parents and other interested citizens in both Dearborn Township No. 7 and No. 2 who donated their time, money, and effort to make Lowrey's student exchange program successful. The Warren Valley Kiwanis Club gave \$100 last year toward these expenses. The host family was allotted a small amount from this fund.

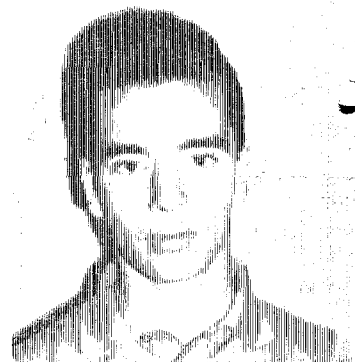
The victory over Haston gave Lowrey its second win of its season. The first win was against Mason.
