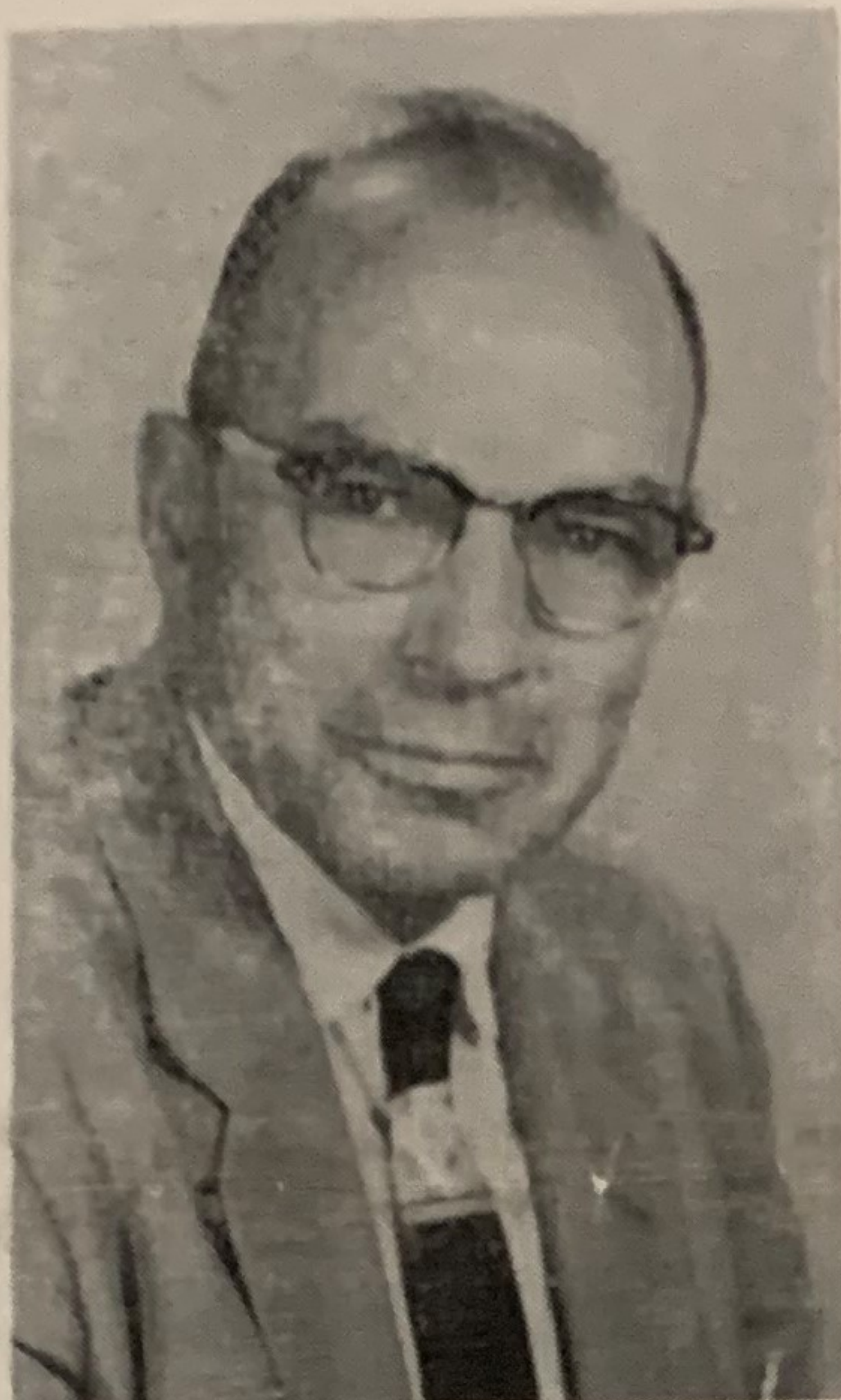

## Mr. Cady To Retire Worked At Lowrey For Thirty Years

Mr. Charles Cady, assistant principal at Lowrey, will be retiring immediately following the end of the first semester.

His retirement is well deserved. For forty years, Mr. Cady has been in the teaching profession, thirty of which were spent at Lowrey. He recalled that when he first came here from Fordson in 1935, the school had been strictly

a junior high and that there had been just as many children here then as there are in the entire school today. In 1954, Mr. Cady became assistant principal and holds that position today.

When asked whether he had noticed any significant changes in student attitudes and in teaching through the years, he stated that he had, but believed that it was all a part of the great change in the social structure of the nation.

According to Mr. Cady teaching methods are much better today. The use of audio and visual aids has already increased the amount of material which can be taught by the teacher. The student must learn more today because of the compressed knowledge. Thirty years ago the student was taught entirely from the text. But today he is encouraged to find outside sources of information. There is also a better student-teacher relationship.

Mr. Cady's plans for the future include traveling, preferably south, and just plain relaxation.

In behalf of the student body, we would like to extend to Mr. Cady the hope that his retirement will be very enjoyable.

## 66 Sophomore To Be Last Group From Best

## District Seven Votes For New High School

Recently voters in District 7 approved the issuance of bonds and the raising of taxes so that the district will have its own high school.

The results of the election has raised many questions as to what will happen to Lowrey High School and the High School students attending here.

### Comments of Dr. Seavitt

According to Dr. Seavitt all students attending Lowrey High School are scheduled to complete their schooling here. In addition, he pointed out, we will receive tenth graders from O. W. Best in September of 66. This will be the last group from District 7 to attend high school in Dearborn. Binning in September 1966, O. W. Best students will remain there and become members of the high school's first graduating class. Many additions are planned to convert O. W. Best from a junior high to a high school.

### Comments to a Mr. Jones

According to Mr. Jones, superintendent of District 7 schools, science rooms will be added to the school, auto and electronic shops will be added, and the home economics area will be enlarged. He added that sports and a band will be part of the high school's extensive program.

A new junior high school is to be constructed in District 7 at Powers and Pardee.

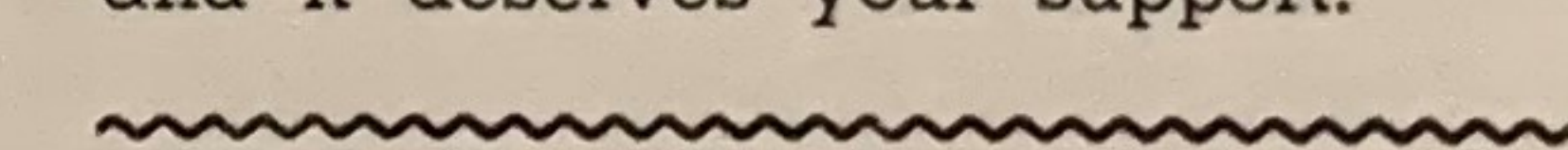
The issuance of \$1.6 million in bonds was approved by a 1,303 to 316 vote. The raising of taxes by five mills for a five year period was almost the same, 1,289 to 350 votes.

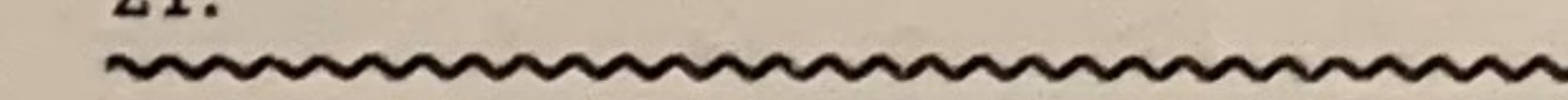

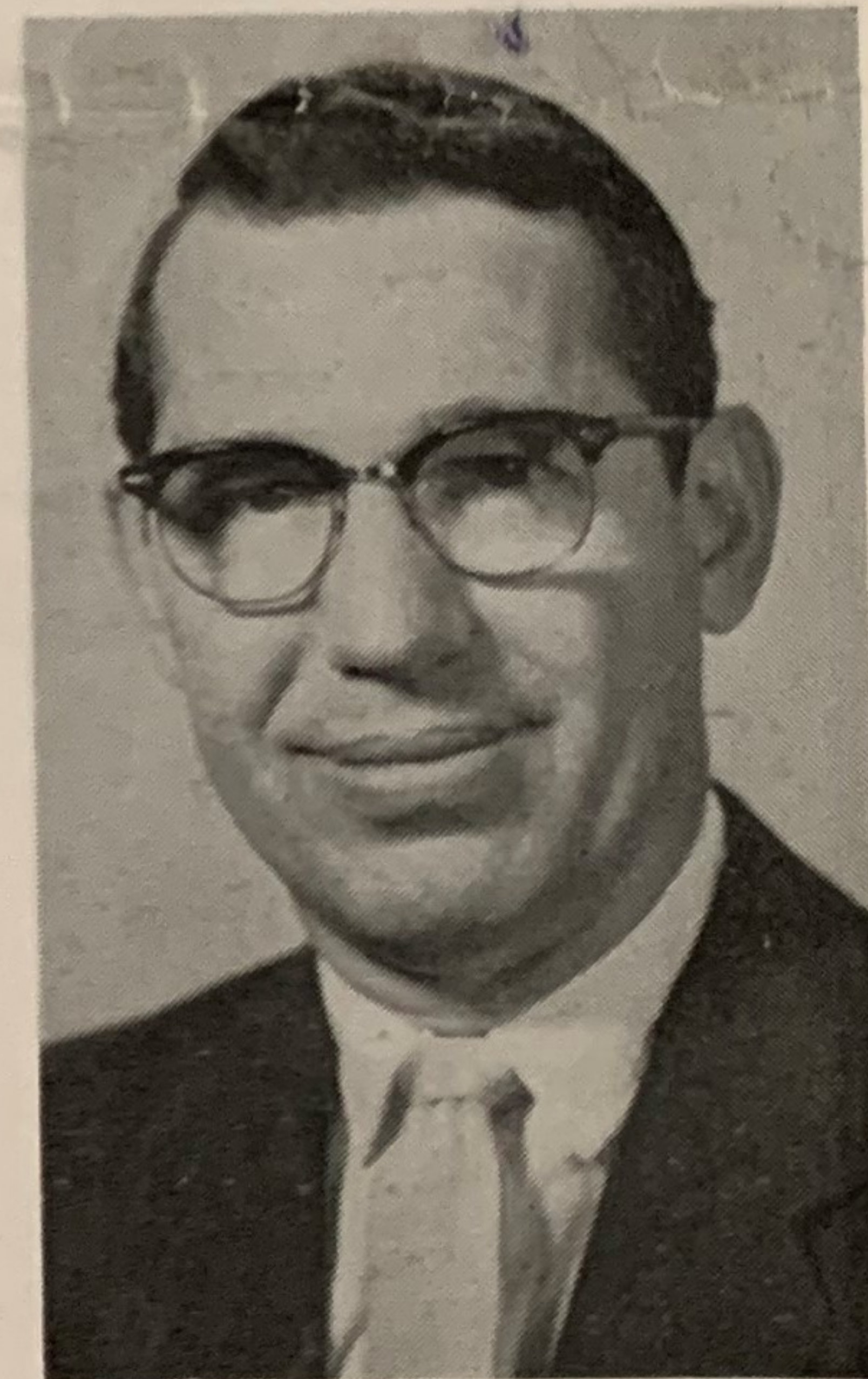

Another new addition is a card catalogue of 108 drawers. Miss MacKenzie said, "This is a beautiful functional piece of library furniture which all students should take interest in."

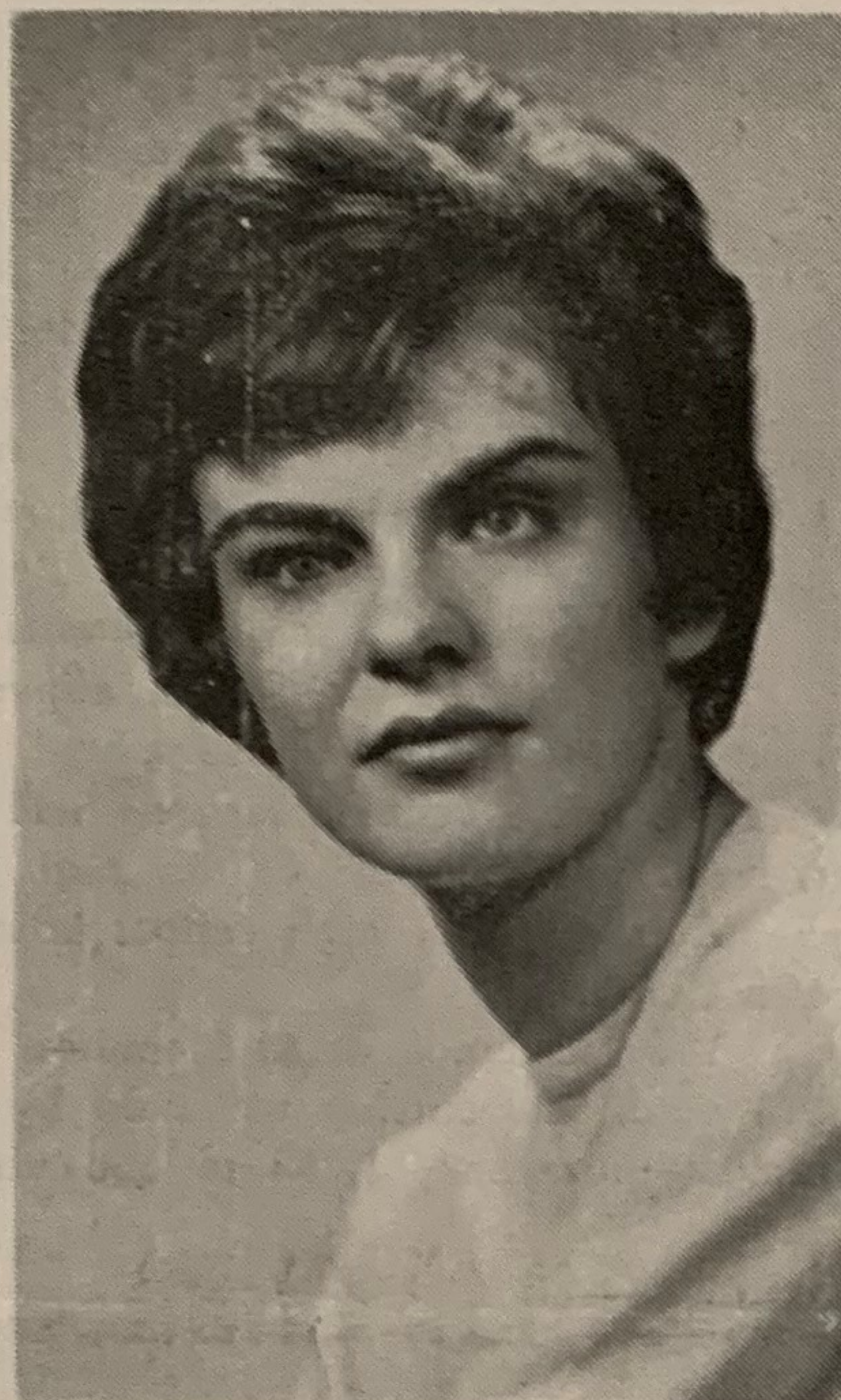
All tables are refinished, and all chairs are new. The new bookshelves and book carts are very handsome and attractive.

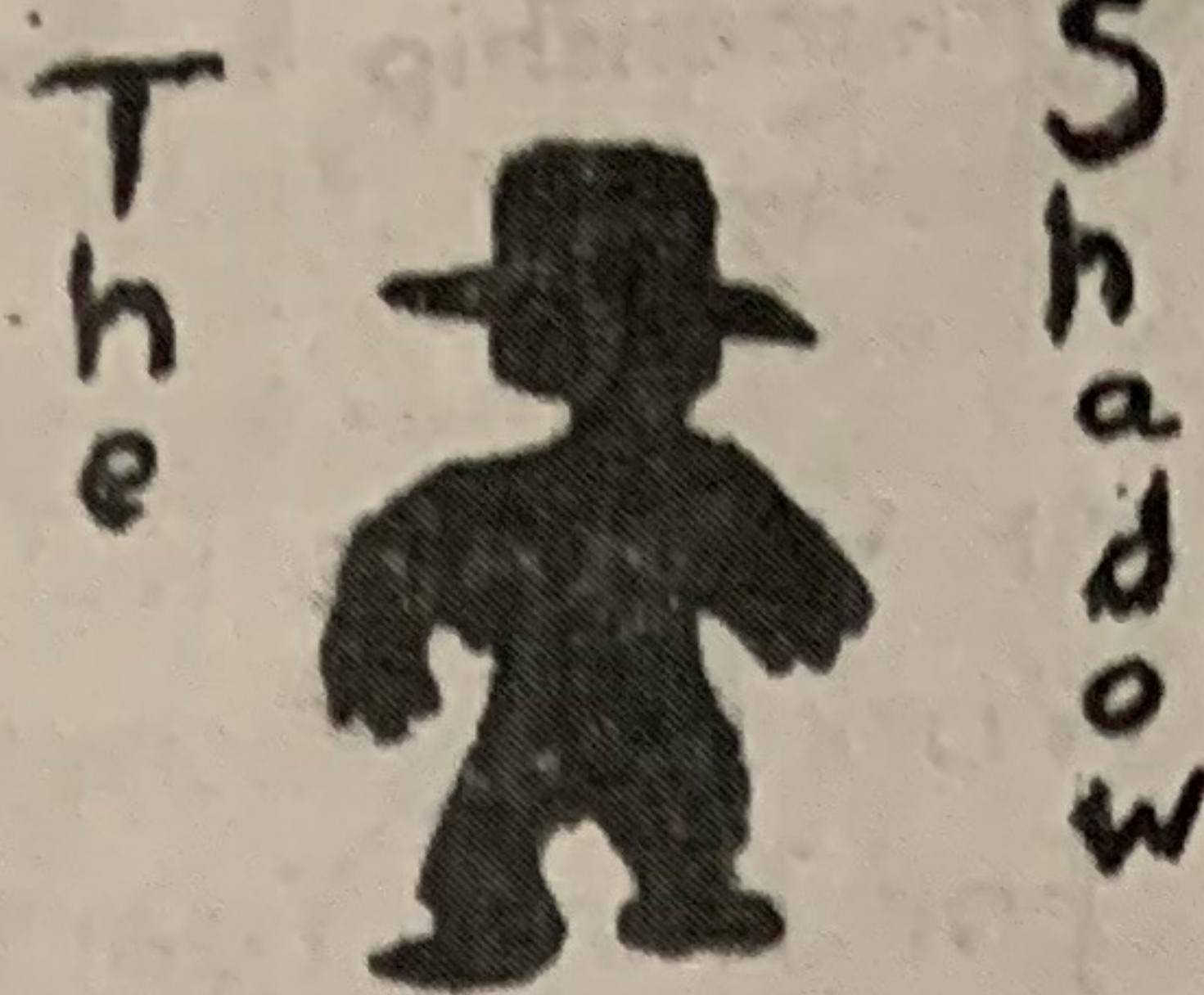
school. This past summer she was named to supervise the high school volunteer workers at the hospital. After college graduation Miss Clark hopes to teach the mentally retarded.

## Three Seniors Semi - Finalists In Math Contest

Recently, three of our students, Jan Ting, Jan Wissmuller, and Richard Fritz, were notified that they are in the semi-finalist category in the Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition Test. The following is an interview with Jan Wissmuller.

Question: What did the test consist of?

Answer: There were forty questions on the first test. It lasted for one hundred minutes. If you got seventeen right, you were considered a semi-finalist.

Question: Did you take a second test? What was it like?

Answer: It consisted of six questions. The time allowance was again 100 minutes. The total score of the two tests decides the finalists.

Question: Do you know the results yet?

Answer: No, I expect to know the results by the end of January or the first week in February.

Question: What did you think of the tests?

Answer: I think it is a good challenge and that we should have to take a test like it at least once a month. In short, I thought it was tough.

Richard and Jan Ting were also asked for their opinions and herewith we present their replies. Jan Ting—"It was tres difficile." Richard Fritz—"I never thought I would make the finals, but it is both a thrill and an honor to be one of three to represent Lowrey."

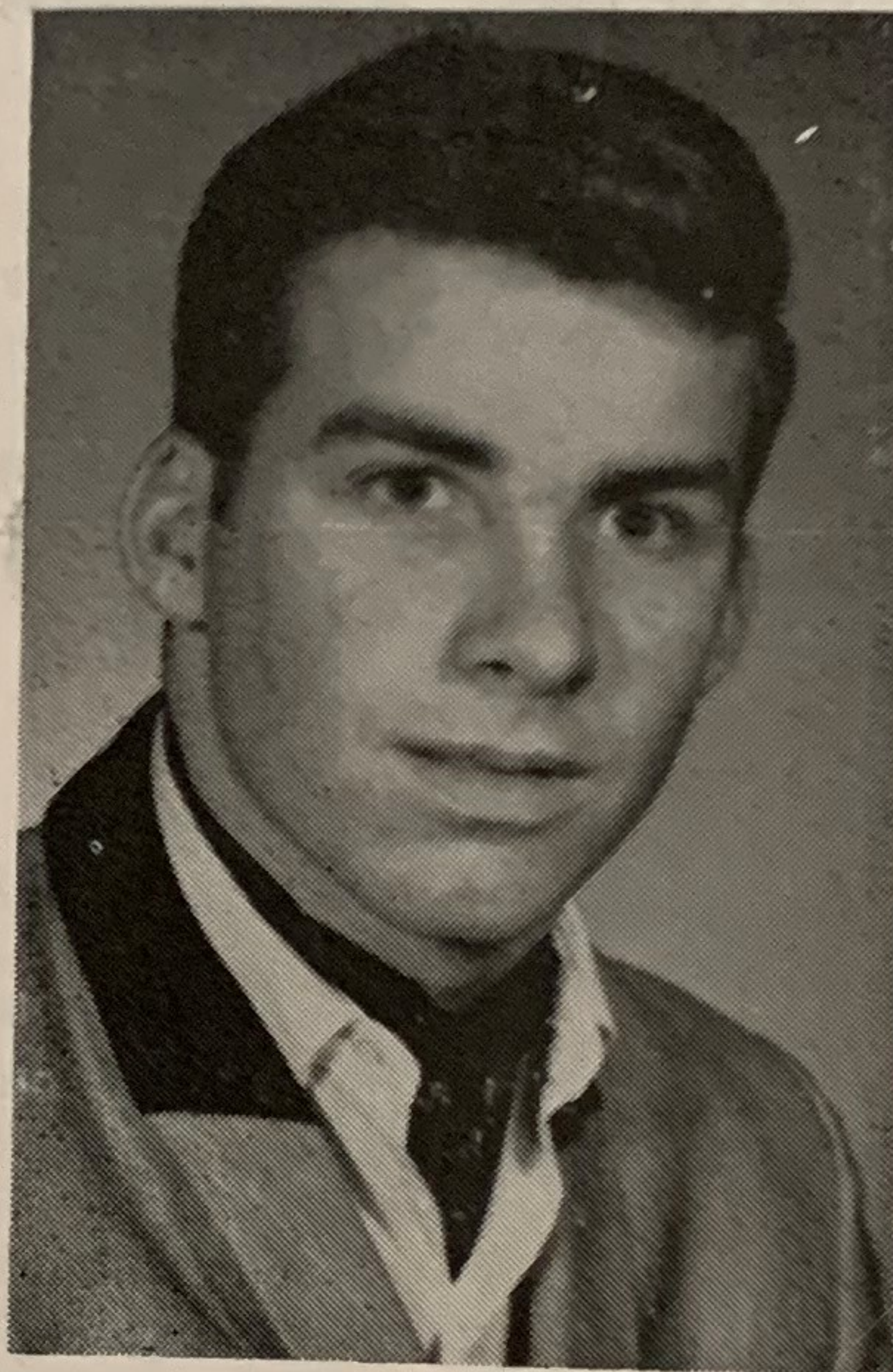

On Saturday the fifteenth, Lowrey is going to the Brush-up Tournament in Ann Arbor which is sponsored by the University of Michigan.

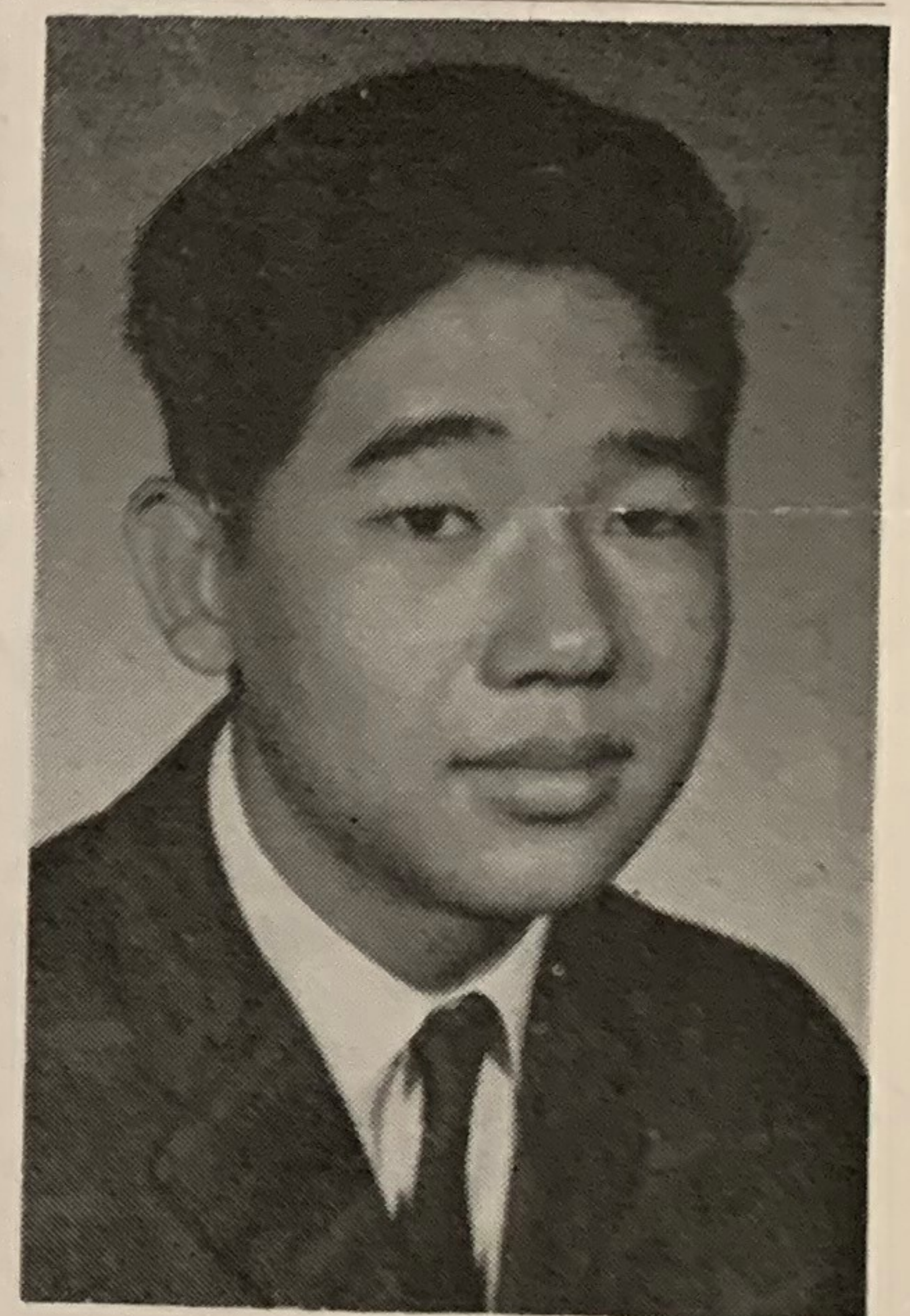

## Swimming History

The art of swimming and diving, as practiced by man, dates back to prehistoric times. However, the sophisticated styles with which we are familiar today did not begin until the late nineteenth century.

Before this, the Associated Metropolitan Swimming Clubs of London were organized in 1862 to promote competitive swimming.

Only three swimming events were held at the first Olympiad at Athens in 1896; these were freestyle races at 100, 500, and 1200 meters. It was not until 1908 that the current Olympic swimming program was established: free-style races at 100, 400, and 1500 meters; free-style relay at 88, meters; backstroke race at 100 meters; and breast stroke race at 200 meters.

50 yard free-style in 75 foot pool

Our Varsity Polar Bears were defeated by the first place Schafer Vikings on Tuesday, January 11, at Schafer High, 66-57.

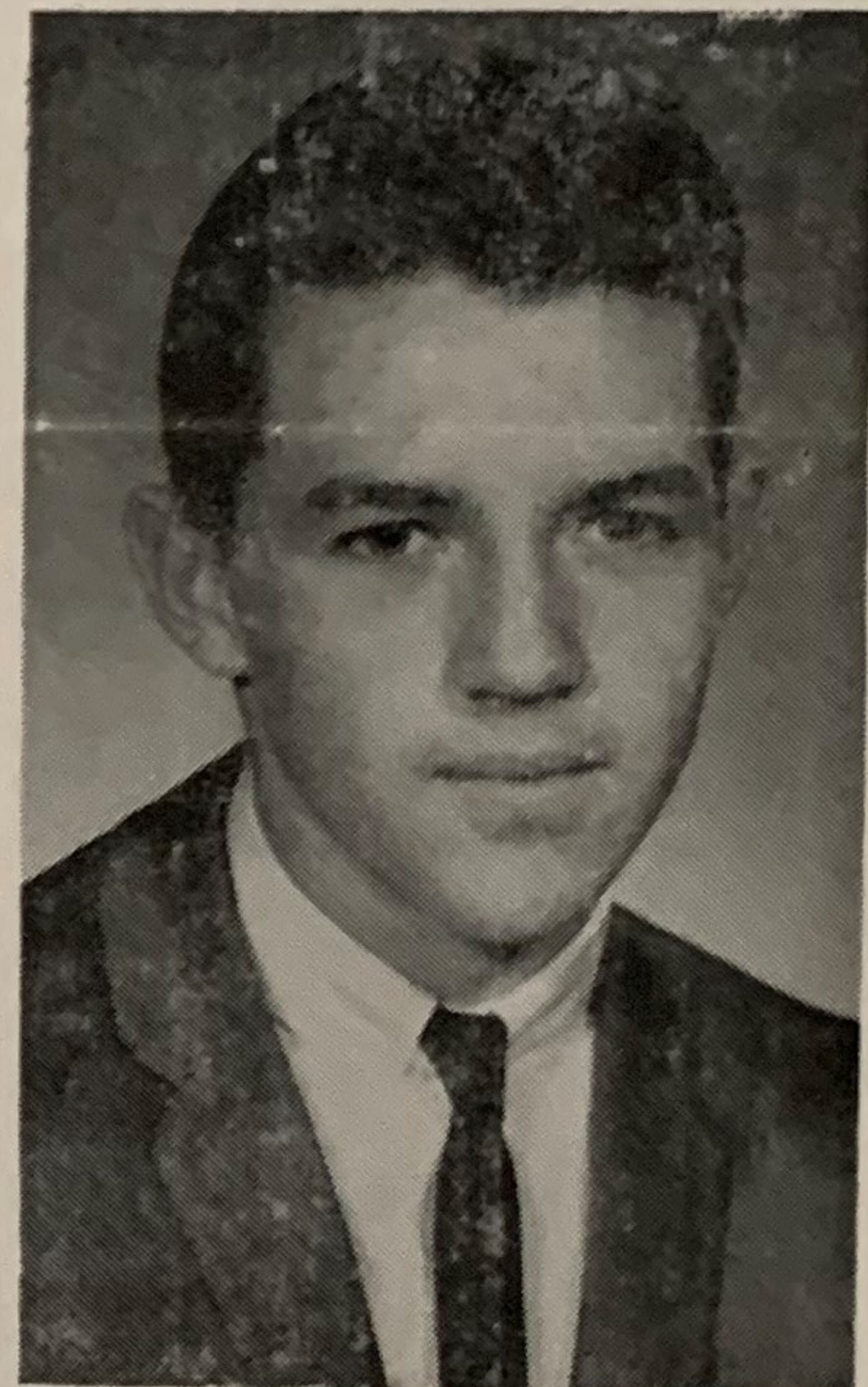
