
J. Micheal Wilson and Steve Robbins will be the featured guests. Along with records, they will bring one or two live bands the names of which are not known at this time.

Lowrey Students Make Plans For Summer Trip To Europe

Five weeks in London, England plus a trip to Paris. Does this sound fabulous? Seven Lowrey students will have this experience this summer as they fly to the island nation to study Chaucerian and Shakespearean literature. The seven students: Barb Bodell-11A1, Nancy Brown-12A2, Sallye Herndon-12A5, Allen Huls-12A6 Sally Knight-10A7, Donna Oakley-12A9, and Cathy Wesner-10A14, plus two other students from John Kennedy and Dearborn High, will leave New York City on July 20 for London with Lowrey English teacher Mr. William Leslie, who will act as their chaperon-counselor on the trip. They will live and study on campus at the University of Reading while there, taking numerous excursions and weekend trips including one to Stratford-on-Avon to see a Shakespearean play. Another week-long trip will send the group to 'gay Paris' for sightseeing and study. The normal study day will consist of four hours of intensive classroom work, with evenings spent at lectures, hikes, films, visits in local homes, and generally becoming acquainted with the cus-

Students Hear "College" Lecture

A first-class lecture was arranged for advanced science students last March 7. Dr. Richard A. Flinn, University of Michigan professor, came to Lowrey that day to talk to Chemistry and Physics II classes on "Observing the Effects of Stress on Metal Structures Under the Microscope."

Stress is a term used to describe forces applied to metals to determine maximums of force that they can withstand beyond which they will break, stretch, or become permanently altered. Finding this statistic for different metals is necessary in determining the proper metal to utilize for different operations.

Dr. Flinn teaches metallurgy, the science of metals and their properties, at the U of M. He seemed very much at home with his Lowrey listeners, speaking in a pleasing, congenial, and entirely understandable manner. After he had ended his lecture proper, he found time to give interested students some information about careers in metallurgy.

In the near future, another Uor M professor will visit to lecture on "Nuclear Radiation." This one promises to be even more interesting.




