

Polar Bears Top Tough Rebel Team

Our varsity football squad continued its undefeated league play by defeating Riverside 13-7 in an exciting game won in the last 30 seconds on a 35 yard pass play from John Hull to Brian Mertz. The game was played at home on Friday, September 30.

The game started with Riverside receiving the kickoff. They held the ball shortly, progressing only to their own 40 yard line where they had to punt. The Bears moved the ball down to the Riverside 20. The threat was squelched though when a holding penalty pushed the Bears back 15 yards. They got the ball down to the Riverside 18 but lost it on downs. The Rebels got to their 42 where the period ended.

REBELS SCORE FIRST

Failing to get the first down Coach Weller had a comment af- Riverside punted to the Lowrey 10. On the first play the Bears fumbled and Riverside recovered on the Lowrey 12. On their first play the rebels scored. Their extra point was made and they took the lead 7-0. Steve Gerych took the kickoff and ran it back 23 yards. The Bears failed to take advantage of this again, because of another holding penalty. Lowrey lost the ball on downs and Riverside took over on the Lowrey 48. They moved the ball down to the Bears 26 but lost it on a fumble covered by John Hull. Lowrey moved the ball up to our 46. There Steve Gerych broke away and ran all the way to the Rebels 11 yard line. Two plays later John Hull took the ball over from the 5 for a Lowrey touchdown. The try for extra point failed but the Polar Bears were on the scoreboard. The rest of the first half went without further scoring.


TOUCHDOWN NULLIFIED

Lowrey received the kickoff to start the third period. They moved the ball up to the 40 where they fumbled, Riverside covering the loose ball. The Lowrey defense, tough the whole game, forced Riverside to punt. The punt was taken at the Lowrey 19. The Bears again started a drive that moved the ball to our 37.
